

THREE LAW SCHOOLS WILL AID MINORITIES

LOS ANGELES — The University of California at Los Angeles, the University of Southern California and Loyola University will conduct a joint summer program to increase minority enrollments in their law schools.

The Legal Education Opportunity Program of Southern California will be held at the U.C.L.A. Law School June 24 to Aug. 16 and staffed by faculties from the three law schools. Attending will be Negro and Mexican-American June graduates and those entering their senior year next fall.

The program is funded by a \$76,000 grant from the National Council on Legal Education Opportunity. Financial aid also will be made available to those who subsequently enter law school.

Forty minority students will be given an introduction to legal education in such areas as criminal and constitutional law, according to the program director, Professor Leon Letwin of U.C.L.A.

The students will take field trips to civil and criminal courts, legal aid and lawyers' offices "to give them the feel of the practice of law, as well as practical exposure to some of the problems being studied in the classroom," Dr. Letwin said.

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
